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# LACE STRIPES SCARF

# DESIGNED BY: ALICE TANG FOR RED HEART YARN



Simplicity and elegance meet in the gorgeous Lace Stripes Scarf pattern. This beautiful scarf features stripes made by a simple lace pattern. If you are a beginning knitter looking for a lace pattern to tackle, this is a good place to start. All knitters will be able to appreciate the versatile and charming nature of this knit scarf pattern. You will be able to wear this scarf anywhere; it will be a wonderful complement to any outfit.

# **MATERIALS**

- RED HEART® Heart & Sole® with Aloe: 4 balls 3115 Ivory
- Susan Bates® Knitting Needles: 3.75mm [US 5]
- Stitch markers, yarn needle

Size: Scarf measures 15" (38cm) wide x 59" (150cm) long

GAUGE: 22 sts = 4" (10cm); 32 rows = 4" (10cm) over lace pattern. EXACT GAUGE IS NOT ESSENTIAL FOR THIS PROJECT. Use any size needles to obtain the gauge.

# **INSTRUCTIONS**

#### **NOTES**

- 1. Shawl is worked in one piece beginning atone short edge.
- 2. There is a Seed stitch border worked on all edges and a lace pattern worked between the borders.
- 3. Lace pattern can be worked by reading the written instructions or following the chart.

#### **SHAWL**

Cast on 80 sts.

#### SEED STITCH BORDER

**Row 1 (wrong side):** \*K1, p1; repeat from \*across.



Row 2:\*P1, k1; repeat from \* across. Rows 3 and 4: Repeat last 2 rows.

#### BEGIN LACE PATTERN

**Row 1 (wrong side):** [K1, p1] twice (for Seed st border), place marker, purl to last 4 sts, place marker, [k1, p1] twice (for Seed st border).

**Row 2:** [P1, k1] twice, slip marker, \*yo, k2,k2tog, k2; repeat from \* to next marker, slip marker, [p1, k1] twice.

**Row 3**:[K1, p1] twice, slip marker, purl to next marker, slip marker, [k1, p1] twice.

**Row 4**: [P1, k1] twice, slip marker, \*k2, k2tog,k2, yo; repeat from \* to next marker, slip marker, [p1, k1] twice.

**Row 5:** Repeat Row 3.

Repeat Rows 2–5 until piece measures about  $58\frac{1}{2}$ " (148.5cm) from beginning, end with a wrong side row.


# SEED STITCH BORDER

**Row 1** (right side): \*P1, k1; repeat from \* across.

**Row 2**: \*K1, p1; repeat from \* across.

Rows 3 and 4: Repeat last 2 rows.

Bind off.





# EASY OATMEAL SCARF

# DESIGNED BY: LOUISE FROM LOUISE KNITS



INSTRUCTIONS
Row 1- \*k1, p1\* repeat from \*
Row 2-knit

Don't you love the creamy color of this free knitting pattern? Make yourself or your little one an Easy Oatmeal Scarf and stay nice and warm. A simple rib pattern gives this knit scarf pattern its distinctive texture. This pattern is an easy project, perfect for the mom on the go or a last minute gift. Since two rows repeat endlessly to make this scarf, you'll never have trouble finding your place in the pattern. You can take this scarf anywhere without worrying.

# **Materials**

- 1 -2 Balls worsted weight yarn of your choice
- Size 5 mm (U.S. 8) knitting

Repeat rows 1 and 2 until scarf has reached desired length. You can knit the project as a scarf or join the ends for an infinity cowl.



# **LOVELY LACE SCARF**

# DESIGNED BY: RED HEART YARN



This gorgeous and light scarf knitting pattern is a great summer project. Made with just one ball of Red Heart Boutique yarn, you'll be able to whip up a Lovely Lace Scarf in a weekend! This simple pattern is also great for beginner knitters, so get your needles ready to rock and

# **Materials:**

- RED HEART® Boutique<sup>TM</sup> "Changes<sup>TM</sup>": 1 Ball 9560 Amethyst
  - Knitting Needles: 6mm [US 10].
  - Yarn needle.

**Size**: Scarf measures  $6\frac{1}{2}$ " x 44".

**GAUGE**: 16 stitches = 4"; 26 rows = 4" in Stockinette stitch. CHECK YOUR GAUGE. Use any size needles to obtain the gauge.

# **INSTRUCTIONS:**

Cast on 26 sts.

Knit 1 row.

Row 1: K2, \*[k2tog] twice, [yo, k1] 3 times, yo, [k2tog] twice; repeat from \* once, k2.

Row 2: K2, purl to last 2 sts, k2.

Row 3: Knit.

Row 4: Knit.

Repeat Rows 1-4 until piece measures 44", end with Row 1.

Knit 1 row.

Bind off.

#### **FINISHING**

Weave in ends.



# **BARK SCARF**

# BY: LYNN ANNE FROM NONSUCH KNITS



With the cold weather just around the corner, who wouldn't be interested in free knit scarf patterns? The Bark Scarf Knit offers both warmth and style. Its unique pattern can be knitted in whatever color you choose.

Finished Measurement - 79" x 7.5"

# **Materials**

- DeSoto Bend Alpacas DK weight, (60% Alpaca, 40% Wool; 200 yds/183 m), 2 skeins Loden
- One size 7 (4.5mm) needle
- Darning needle
- Scissors

# Gauge

4stitches/inch in pattern

# **INSTRUCTIONS:**

Cast on 34 stitches.

(Knit 2, purl 2), repeat across row to last 2 stitches, knit 2. Repeat this row on both sides of scarf to desired length.

Bind off; weave in ends.



# **SCRUNCHY RIB SCARF**

# DESIGNED BY: JENNIFER FROM THE KNIT MONSTER



Bone up on your knit and purl stitches with this Scrunchy Rib Scarf. If you're just starting out with the very basics, this knitted scarf pattern will give you lots of practice. A simple rib pattern makes up this basic scarf, so it's a perfect first or second project that has the added benefit of keeping you toasty warm in the winter. Beginning knitters will love the simplicity of this pattern.

**Finished Measurements:** 50 inches by 7 1/2 inches (when laid flat, the scarf will tend roll and bunch in the width).

# **Materials**

- 2 skeins of worsted weight yarn—sample knit with two skeins of Lionbrand Wool-Ease, Ranch Red
- 5.5 mm (U.S. size 9) knitting needles

# Gauge

16 st per 4 inches (gauge is not crucial for this project)

# **INSTRUCTIONS**

Cast on 34 st.

Row 1: K2, P2; repeat to last 2 st, K2

Row 2: Knit

Repeat these two rows for 50 inches, ending with row 2. Bind off in pattern.



# CHAIN STITCH SCARF

# DESIGNED BY: BERNAT DESIGN TEAM



Knit sideways, the Chain Stitch Scarf is a quick project that will shake up your usual knitting routine. This knit scarf pattern has a slightly lacy look that makes it a fun accessory. It's also a great pattern for showing off that funky art yarn you bought at the local yarn store the other day (you know which skein I'm talking about). Bigger needles are used to make this one fast project, perfect for last minute gifts or a busy weekend.

# **MEASUREMENTS** 5 x 50 ins [12.5 x 127 cm]

# **MATERIALS**

- Bernat Bamboo (60 g/2.1 oz;57 m/63 yds) Rosehip
- Size 6 mm (U.S. 10) circular knitting needle 16 ins [40 cm] long or size needed to obtain gauge.

# **GAUGE**

14 sts and 20 rows = 4 ins [10 cm] in stocking st.

#### **INSTRUCTIONS**

Cast on 171 sts. Do not join in rnd. Working back and forth in rows, proceed as follows:

1st row: (WS). Knit.

**2nd row:** \*P1. S11P. Rep from \* to last st. P1. **3rd row**: K2. \*S11. K1. Rep from \* to last st. K1.

**4th to 7th rows:** Beg with a knit row, work in stocking st.

Rep 2nd to 7th rows for 5 ins [12.5 cm], then 2nd and 3rd rows once.

**Next row:** Knit. Cast off knitwise (WS).

# **FINISHING**

Weave in ends.



# BASIC CABLE SCARF

# DESIGNED BY: BERNAT DESIGN TEAM



Chunky, cozy cables always look appealing in the cold of winter. Beginning knitters can sometimes be intimidated by these curvy patterns, but with patterns like the Basic Cable Scarf on your side, you don't have to fear. This knit scarf pattern makes cables very accessible to the fledgling knitter, and the bold pattern is the perfect addition to your winter wardrobe. Learn something new and try this easy cable scarf pattern today.

# **MEASUREMENTS**

Approx 8 x 72 ins [20.5 x 183 cm].

# **MATERIALS**

- Bernat Roving 3 Balls
- Size 8 mm (U.S. 11) knitting needles or size needed to obtain gauge.

# **GAUGE**

10 sts and 14 rows = 4 ins [10 cm] in stocking st.

# **INSTRUCTIONS**

Cast on 26 sts.

**1st row:** (RS). \*K2. P2. Rep from \* to last 2 sts. K2. 2nd row: \*P2. K2. Rep from \* to last 2 sts. P2.

Rep last 2 rows (K2. P2) ribbing twice more, inc 2 sts evenly across last row. 28 sts.

# Proceed in pattern as follows:

1st row: (RS). K2. K2tog. yo. K2. P2. yo. K3. ssk. K7. P2. K2. K2tog. yo. K2. **2nd row:** P2. K2tog. yo. P2. K2. P6. P2togtbl. P3. yo. P1. K2. P2. K2tog. yo. P2. 3rd row: K2. K2tog. yo. K2. P2. K2. yo. K3. ssk. K5. P2. K2. K2tog. yo. K2. 4th row: P2. K2tog. yo. P2. K2. P4. P2togtbl. P3. yo. P3. K2. P2. K2tog. yo. P2. **5th row:** K2. K2tog. yo. K2. P2. K4. yo. K3. ssk. K3. P2. K2. K2tog. yo. K2.



6th row: P2. K2tog. yo. P2. K2. P2. P2togtbl. P3. yo. P5. K2. P2. K2tog. yo. P2. 7th row: K2. K2tog. yo. K2. P2. K6. yo. K3. ssk. K1. P2. K2. K2tog. yo. K2. 8th row: P2. K2tog. yo. P2. K2. P2togtbl. P3. yo. P7. K2. P2. K2tog. yo. P2. 9th row: K2. K2tog. yo. K2. P2. K7. K2tog. K3. yo. P2. K2. K2tog. yo. K2. 10th row: P2. K2tog. yo. P2. K2. P1. yo. P3. P2tog. P6. K2. P2. K2tog. yo. P2. 11th row: K2. K2tog. yo. K2. P2. K5. K2tog. K3. yo. K2. P2. K2. K2tog. yo. K2. 12th row: P2. K2tog. yo. P2. K2. P3. yo. P3. P2tog. P4. K2. P2. K2tog. yo. P2. 13th row: K2. K2tog. yo. K2. P2. K3. K2tog. K3. yo. K4. P2. K2. K2tog. yo. K2. 14th row: P2. K2tog. yo. P2. K3. K2tog. K3. yo. K4. P2. K2. K2tog. yo. K2. 15th row: K2. K2tog. yo. K2. P2. K1. K2tog. K3. yo. K6. P2. K2. K2tog. yo. K2. 16th row: P2. K2tog. yo. P2. K2. P7. yo. P3. P2tog. K2. P2. K2tog. yo. P2. 16th row: P2. K2tog. yo. P2. K2. P7. yo. P3. P2tog. K2. P2. K2tog. yo. P2.

Rep last 16 rows until Scarf measures approx. 70½ ins [179 cm], ending on a 8th or 16th row of pat and dec 2 sts evenly across last row. 26 sts.

Work 6 rows in (K2. P2) ribbing. Cast off in ribbing.

#### **FINISHING**

Weave in ends.



# ALASKAN DREAM SCARF

# DESIGNED BY: SARAH FROM KNITTING-AND



Take a journey through an icy tundra with this delicate Alaskan Dream Scarf wrapped loosely around your neck. Its icy blue color and lacy construction result in a fragile-looking garment that'll remind you of the first snowfall during winter. Thanks to knit scarf patterns like this one, you'll be able to keep warm without sacrificing your style.

# **MATERIALS**

- 1x100gm skein of Touch Yarns 12 ply Brushed Kid Mohair/Merino Wool in color 527 (Sky), 220m per 100gm
  - 4.5mm 40cm long circular needle
  - 5.5mm 40cm long circular needle
- o If you prefer to knit the scarf on straight needles, you will need a pair of both 4.5mm and 5.5mm needles.

# **GAUGE**

16sts to 10cm over stocking stitch on 5.5mm needles.

# **INSTRUCTIONS**

Using 5.5mm needles, cast on 24sts and knit 2 rows.

1st row: K1, ssk, \*(yo) twice, sl2tog, k1, psso; rep from \* to last 3 sts, (yo) twice, k2tog, k1

2nd row: K3, p1 \*K2, p1; rep from \* until 2sts remain, k2

3rd and 4th rows: Knit

These 4 rows form the eyelet pattern for the ends of the scarf. Repeat these 4 rows another 23

times.

Change to 4.5mm needles.

**Next row:** (K2, p2) 6 times.

Repeat this row until the ribbed section of the scarf measures 35cm.

Change back to 5.5mm needles and knit 2 rows.

Work 24 repeats of the eyelet stitch pattern. Cast off.

Wash your scarf and bock the lace ends lightly.



# MAE GERI LACY SCARF

# DESIGNED BY: DOROTHY FROM LITTLE THEOREM



The Mae Geri Lacy Scarf is both soft and delicate, so why does its name mean "front kick" in Japanese? This beautiful lace scarf pattern was named after the designer's mother, a graceful woman who also happens to be a third dan black belt in shotokan karate. This intricate lace scarf reminds us that true power comes from within, and that one should never judge a book by its cover. The Mae Geri Lacy Scarf makes an empowering gift for those in need of motivation of encouragement.

# **MATERIALS**

- Debbie Bliss Pure Silk. Two balls =250m
- 4.5mm / US 7 needles

**GAUGE** 

22 stitches = 4" in stocking stitch with 4mm/US 6 needles

#### **ABBREVIATIONS**

k2togtbl - knit two together through the back of the loops

p2togtbl - purl two stitches together through the back of the loops

#### **INSTRUCTIONS**

CO 29 stitches. Work in garter stitch (knit every row) for 8 rows. Now work pattern as follows:

Row 1: k6 \*k2tog, yo, k5\* until 2 stitches remain, k2.

Row 2: k2 p3 \*p2togtbl, yo, p1, yo, p2tog p2\* to last 3 stitches p1 k2.

Row 3: k4 \*k2tog yo k3 yo sl1 k1 psso\* to last 4 stitches, k4.

Row 4: k2, p to last 2 stitches, k2.

Row 5: k4 \* yo sl1 k1 psso k5\* to last 4 stitches, k4.

Row 6: k2 p1 \*p1 yo p2tog p2 p2togtbl yo\* to last 5 stitches, p3 k2.

Row 7: k3 \*k3 yo sl1 k1 psso k2tog yo\* to last 5 stitches, k5.

Row 8: k2, purl to last 2 stitches, k2.

Repeat these 8 rows until scarf measures 60", or as long as desired. Knit 8 rows and bind off on wrong side. Weave in loose ends.
