How to Knit a Hat Volume 2: Free Knit Hat Patterns for the Whole Family

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Her Royal Highness Hat By: Jennifer Dickerson from Fiber Flux

Children's hat patterns should be all about whimsicality, color, and texture. Her Royal Highness Hat hits the mark for all three. This adorable knit hat pattern is an ode to purple, pink, and sweet applique gemstones. This hat is perfect for your little princess as she braves the wildness of the backyard sandbox or tames the fire-breathing dragon (AKA the family dog). This hat is a charming option for mild winter afternoons or cool spring nights.



Materials:

- 1 Skein Lion Brand Hometown
- Various yarn scraps in "gem-like" colors
- US 11 (8 mm) Circular Needles
- US 11 (8mm) DPNs
- Crochet hook ("N" hook for hat, "I" hook for gems)
- Tapestry Needle

Size: Child (6-12)

Instructions:

CO 48 sts, PM and join for working in the round. Work in K2, P2 ribbing for 2." Switch to stockinette and work until hat is 8" from CO edge.

Decrease:

Row 1: K2tog, K2 around

Row 2: Knit

Row 3: K2tog, k1 around

Row 4: Knit

Row 5: K2tog around

Cut yarn, leaving long tail.

Using tapestry needle run through remaining stitches and pull tightly. Weave in ends.

Gems:

Chain 4, sl st to beginning ch to form a ring. Work 12 dc into ring. Sl st into beginning dc to join.

Weave in ends. Stitch to hat.



Loveable Little Stem Hat By: Judit from MonsterYarns

Some baby knits are so cute we could just eat them up. The <u>Loveable Little Stem Hat</u> is one of those adorable knit baby hat patterns we can't resist. This simple striped baby hat is adorned with a sweet stem, giving the pattern a touch of whimsy. We love the Loveable Little Stem Hat in the calming combination of blues as shown in the photo, but a mix of pinks and other pastels would be equally precious.



Materials:

- 1 x 100g ball Kiddies Couture DK Shade
- 100 Marine Stripe or DK of your choice
- Set of 4mm knitting needles

Size: 3-6 months & 6-12 months

Tip: Start with the stem and sew it right side out, turn and sew on wrong side.

Instructions:

Cast on 73(82) stitches

Begin with a knit row, work 40 rows (approx. 18cms) in Stocking Stitch

Dec row K1 (k2tog, k7) 8(9) - 65(73) sts P 1 row

Dec rowK1 (k2tog, k6) 8(9) times - 57(64) sts P 1 row

Dec row 1 K1 (k2tog, k5) 8(9) times - 49(55)sts remain

P 1 row

Dec row 1 K1 (k2tog, k4) 8(9) times - 41(46)sts remain

P 1 row

Dec row 1 K1 (k2tog, k3) 8(9) times - 33(37)sts remain

P 1 row

Dec row 1 K1 (k2tog, k2) 8(9) times - 25(28)sts remain

P 1 row

Next row K1 (0) (k2tog) to end - 13(14)sts remain

P 1 row

Next row K1 (0) (k2tog) to end - 7 sts remain

Begin with a P row and knit 10 rows in stocking stitch

Break yarn leaving approx. 40 cm –16 ins spare. Thread yarn through the remaining 7 sts. Pull tight and secure.

Join seam reversing seam on lower 2cm for the roll of the hem.



Wish Upon a Star Knit Baby Cap By: Lindsay Obermeyer from Serendipity

This adorable baby hat pattern is a mix of warmth and sweetness. The Wish Upon a Star Knit Baby Cap is adorned with a precious glowing star shooting across a field of calming blue. This hat is knit with worsted weight wool, which is perfect for keeping baby's tiny head nice and cozy. You'll treasure this baby knit long after your little guy outgrows it.



Materials:

- Lion Brand Yarn Baby Wool in Medium Dusty Blue and Creamy Off White
- #7 (4.5mm) 16" circular knitting needles
- #7 (4.5mm) double pointed knitting needles
- Tapestry needle
- Scissors
- Stitch markers

Size: Infant (0-24 months)

Gauge: 5 stitches = 1" / 6 rows = 1"

Instructions:

With blue, cast on 92 stitches. Join circle and place a stitch marker. Work the 2x2 rib for 1."


Work stockinette stitch for the next 3.5." Remember that when you work stockinette in the round, you are knitting every round.

When the hat measures 4.5" from the cast on edge, begin decreasing to shape the crown. Knit for 39 stitches and then K2tog (knit 2 stitches together).

Knit another 39 stitches and K2tog the final 2 stitches for a total of 90 stitches.

Knit another row, placing a stitch marker after every 15 stitches.

To shape the crown, follow the chart, changing to double pointed needles when necessary.



When 5 stitches remain on the needles, break yarn and pull it through stitches. Tighten this circle and weave in the end on the inside of the hat. Weave in all other tails.

Cut 24" length of cream. Thread tapestry needle and chain stitch the tail to your shooting star. Weave in all ends.



Preschooler Rugby Hat By: Jennifer Dickerson from Fiber Flux

Keep an eye on your little one during recess while she wears the <u>Preschooler Rugby Hat</u>. This pretty pink and purple knit hat pattern is the perfect mix of warmth and playfulness. Two thick stripes and a giant fluffy pom pom adorn this simple hat. Experiment with different colors for a boy's hat, or knit one in a solid color or patterned colorway for an equally cute result.



Materials:

- 1 skein Lion Brand Wool Ease Thick & Quick or Lion Brand Hometown USA in the colorway of your choice
- Scraps of the same yarn in a contrasting color for stripes (if desired)
- US15 (10.0 mm) 16" circular needle (round version)
- Set of 4 US15 (10.0 mm) DPNs (round version)
- US15 (10.0 mm) straight needles (flat version)
- Stitch marker
- Tapestry needle

Sizes: Preschooler (3 - 4 years)

Instructions for Knitting Hat in the Round:

CO 44 sts with Main Color (MC)

PM

Join in the round, being careful not to twist.

Round 1: K2, P2 to end of round

Repeat 5 times.

Continuing to work in MC, work in stockinette stitch (st st) for 6 rnds (knit every round)

Use Contrasting Color (CC) for 2 rnd in st st

Work MC for 2 rnds in st st

Work CC for 2 rnds in st st

Work MC for 6 more rnds in st st

To shape crown, switch to DPNs when needed and work entire decrease portion with MC

Rnd 1: K2, K2tog to end of round.

Rnd 2: Knit

Rnd 3: K1, K2tog to end of round

Rnd 4: Knit

Rnd 5: K2tog to end of round

Instructions for Knitting Hat Flat:

CO 44 sts with MC

Round 1: K2, P2 to end of round.

Repeat 5 times.

Continuing to work in MC, work in st st for 6

rows

Switch to CC and work 2 rows st st

Work MC for 2 rows in st st

Work CC for 2 rows in st st

Work MC for 6 more rows in st st

To shape crown, switch to DPNs when needed and work entire decrease portion with MC.

Rnd 1: K2, K2tog to end of round.

Rnd 2: Purl

Rnd 3: K1, K2tog to end of round

Rnd 4: Purl

Rnd 5: K2tog to end of round

Finishing: Using tapestry needle, break yarn, leaving a long tail. Thread through remaining stitches and pull tightly. Seam up back and weave in ends. Add large pom pom if desired.



Asterisk Hat

By: Dot from littletheorem

Modern and masculine, the <u>Asterisk Hat</u> makes a great gift for him. This steel gray knit hat pattern is a snug-fitting beanie with a subtle and sophisticated stitch texture. This hat is constructed with double moss stitch and framed with a simple ribbed edge. It's perfect for year-round wear.



Materials:

- Patons UK Wool Blend DK, 1 skein = 251m
- 4 4mm dpns or 4mm 16" circular needle and 4 4mm dpns.
- 3 stitch markers

Size: Small (18" around, 8" high or Large (20" around, 9" high)

Gauge: 22sts and 30 rows = 4"

Abbreviations:

ssk= slip 2 stitches knitwise, then knit them together with left hand needle psso = pass slipped stitch over

Instructions:

Double moss stitch pattern (DMSP):

Row 1: *k1 p1* to end of row.

Row 2: *k1 p1* to end of row.

Row 3: *p1 k1* to end of row.

Row 4: *p1 k1* to end of row.

Tip: This pattern requires 4 dpns. The decreases at the top are worked in 6 segments, 2 on each dpn.

Cast on 102 (114) stitches, 34 (38) on each of your 3 dpns (if you're using them).

Join in the round and place marker for beginning of the row

Work in k2 p1 rib for 10 rows (or around $1\frac{1}{2}$ "). Work in double moss stitch until hat measures 6" (7"), ending on Row 3 of DMSP

Change to 4 dpns if you were using a circular needle, ensuring you have 34 (36) stitches on each of your 3 working needles.

Work set-up row: *p1, (k1 p1) 8 (9) times, pm, k1 (p1 k1) 8 (9) times, (you should be at the end of a needle)* to end of row.

Work Row 4 of DMSP, placing marker in the middle of each dpn, i.e. after 17 (19) stitches, dividing your stitches into 6 segments for decreases.

Decrease:

Row 1: (ssk k1 *p1 k1* to two stitches before marker, k2tog, slip marker, ssk p1 *k1 p1* to two stitches before end of dpn, k2tog) three times, 12 stitches decreased.

Row 2: (k2 *p1 k1* to one stitch before marker, k1, slip marker, k1 p1 *k1 p1* to one stitch before end of dpn, k1) three times.

Repeat these two rows 6 (7) more times. You should have 18 stitches left.

Final Row: *sl1 k1 psso* to end of row. Cut the yarn leaving 10" tail. Thread this through the remaining stitches and pull tight.

Sew over the hole a couple of times and weave in any loose ends.



Random Factor Hat By: Clare from The Natty Knitter

Watch your man strut his stuff in this snug striped knit hat pattern. The Random Factor Hat is knit with a randomly determined number of rows of alternating colors. Don't let this unique idea scare you; this pattern has an easy-to-follow randomization method. Knit with sock yarn, this striped hat is perfect for a mild spring day or a cool evening. This project makes the perfect gift for math-lovers and hat-lovers alike.



Materials:

- US size 1 (2.25 mm) double pointed needles
- Approx 100 yds of sock yarn in 2 solid colors (50 yds of each color)
- Random number generator or a die

Sizes: 22" diameter, but can be resized to 20" (CO 160 sts, K50 st st rnds before decreasing and repeat decreases 10 times) or 24" (CO 192 sts, K 62 st st rnds before decreasing, and repeat decreases 12 times)

Gauge: 8 sts and 12 rows = 1"

Instructions:

Set parameters of random number generator between 1 and 10. Alternatively, use a die.

Make list of random numbers, the sum of which adds to about 80. Each of these random numbers is the number of rows you will knit to make a stripe.

CO 176 sts in the round using yarn color 1
K1, P1 for 12 rows
Using yarn color 1, K the first randomly
generated number of rows
Join yarn color 2, K the second randomly
generated number of rows
Alternate between yarn colors 1 and 2 until you
have knitted approx 56 rows since the end of
the rib (68 rows in total)

Decrease:

Continue working random number stripes as you decrease. The decreases are worked over 30 rows. Last stripe should be made in yarn color 1, extend number of rows in final stripe if necessary.

(K14, K2tog) x 11 (165 sts) K1 rnd (K13, K2tog) x11 (154 sts) K1 rnd

Continue decreasing 11 sts each rnd until you have 11 sts left.

K 1 rnd K2tog x 5, K1 (6 sts)

Cut yarn, thread through the live sts, pull tight and secure on the inside



Hemp Beanie

By: Elizabeth from The Brown Stitch

Mossy green, steel blue, and light gray combine to form a masculine knit hat pattern perfect for your brother, husband, boyfriend, or dad. The Hemp Beanie is a simple knit beanie pattern with a ribbed, fold-over edge. Perfect for mild winter days or cool spring nights, this classic hat is great for outdoor activities. This rugged yet stylish beanie makes a great gift for him.



Materials:

- 165 yds of main color, 100 yds of each contrasting color in DK yarn
- 1 skein of each of 3 colors.
- 16" / 41 cm circular knitting needles and DPNs in size US 3 / 3.25 mm
- Tapestry needle or crochet hook to weave in ends

Size: Medium/Large (Circ. 18 (20)"/46 (51) cm)

Gauge: 5 sts = 1'' / 2.5 cm in St st

Abbreviations:

CC1 = 1st contrasting color CC2 = 2nd contrasting color

Instructions:

With MC, CO 90 (100) stitches loosely, pm and join in the round (being careful not to twist stitches)

Work in 2x2 Rib until measures 4" / 10 cm from CO edge (will be folded over for a 2" / 5 cm brim)

Continue in St st for 4'' / 10 cm, switching from MC to CC1 and CC2 to create stripe pattern as you desire

Decrease:

Tip: As with previous St st rounds, change colors as you desire to continue stripe pattern. When it becomes too uncomfortable on the circular needles, switch to the double-pointed needles.

*k 7 (8), K2tog; repeat from * to end k 3 rounds

*k 6 (7), K2tog; repeat from * to end k 3 rounds

*k 5 (6), K2tog; repeat from * to end k 3 rounds

*k 4 (5), K2tog; repeat from * to end k 3 rounds

*k 3 (4), K2tog; repeat from * to end k 2 rounds

*k 2 (3), K2tog; repeat from * to end k 1 round

*k 1 (2),K2tog; repeat from * to end k 1 round

*k 0 (1),K2tog

*k2tog; repeat from * to end

Cut yarn, pull to close, and weave in loose ends.



Rickrack Rib Slouchy Hat Pattern By: Linda from Purl Avenue

Casual yet eye-catching, this gorgeous garnet-colored knit hat pattern is perfect for year-round wear. The <u>Rickrack Rib Slouchy Hat</u>

<u>Pattern</u> has a bold texture, making it a perfect accessory for an everyday outfit. This ravishing red beanie is an easy knitting pattern you'll love getting lost in, but you'll love wearing this hat even more. Knit one for a friend who loves bold and beautiful knit accessories.



Materials:

- 1 skein of Deborah Norville Serenity Chunky Weight
- 109vds (100m) per skein
- 3.5oz (100g) per skein
- US 11 (8mm)
- US 10 (6mm) circular needles
- US 11 (8mm) circular needles
- 4 US 11 (8mm) DPNs
- Yarn needle
- Stitch marker

Gauge: 11 sts x 15 rows = 4"

Instructions:

With US 10 (6mm) circular needles, CO 54 sts. Place stitch marker and begin to knit in the round.

Edging:

Rnd 1: *k3, p3; rep from * to end of round. Repeat Rnd 1 three more times.

Rnd 4: *M1, k2, M1, k1, p3; rep from * to end of round. 72sts

Main Body:

Begin to knit with US 11 (8mm) circular needles for this section.

Rnd 1: *p1, k tbl of second stitch on the lefthand needle (leave stitch on needle), then k tthe first stitch, slide both stitches off needle; rep from * to end of round.

Rnd 2: *p1, knit into the front of second stitch on left-hand needle (leave stitch on needle), then knit first stitch, slide both stitches off needle; rep from * to end of round.

Repeat Rnds 1 and 2 until hat reaches 8" from edge.

Decrease:

Switch to US 11 (8mm) DPNs when appropriate.

Rnd 1: *k3tog; rep from * to end of round. 24 sts

Rnd 2: *k3tog; rep from * to end of round. 8 sts.

Cut yarn, leaving an 8" (20.5cm) tail and weave yarn through remaining sts. Pull tightly to close and weave in end.



Cladach Lace Hat By: Dot from littletheorem

This drop dead gorgeous lace hat pattern is a joy to knit as well as wear. The <u>Cladach Lace Hat</u> is a cozy cold weather option full of vintage charm and rustic sweetness. This dainty knit hat offers a great combination of warmth and style, making it perfect for year-round wear. This hat may look complicated, but the lace pattern is simple and easy-to-memorize— ideal for late night knitting in front of the TV.



Materials:

- Rowan Lima, 1 skein = 109yds/100m
- Set of four 5mm/US 8 double pointed needles (dpns) OR one 5mm/US 8 circular needle for magic loop.

Size: Medium (approx. 22" around)

Gauge: 22 stitches and 28 rows = 4" in stocking stitch using 5mm needles; ball-band gauge: 20 sts = 4" in stocking stitch with 5.5mm needles

Abbreviations:

kb= knit into back of next stitch
yo = bring yarn forward
k2 tog = knit next 2 stitches together
sk2p = slip 1, k2tog, pass slipped stitch over

Instructions:

Twisted Rib Pattern (TRP):

Rnd 1: *kb1 p1* to end of row. Repeat Rnd 1 for pattern.

Cladach Lace Pattern (CLP):

Rnd 1: *p2 yo k3 sk2p k3 yo* to end.

Rnd 2: knit

Rnd 3: *p2 k1 yo k2 sk2p k2 yo k1* to end.

Rnd 4: knit

Rnd 5: *p2 k2 yo k1 sk2p k1 yo k2* to end.

Rnd 6: knit

Rnd 7: *p2 k3 yo sk2p yo k3* to end.

Rnd 8: knit

CO 72 stitches over three dpns (27 stitches on first needle, 27 on second, 18 on third) or on circular needle for magic loop method.

Join stitches in the round, ensuring that they're not twisted. If using circular needle, place marker for beginning of row.

Work in TRP for 10 rounds, then work set up round as follows:

Set up round: *p2 yo k7 yo* until end of round. You should now have 88 stitches.

Work in CLP, starting on Round 2. Work to end of instructions, then work chart/written instructions three more times in full.



Work in stocking stitch (i.e. knit every round) for four rounds, then decrease as follows:

Decrease

Rnd 1: *k9 k2tog* to end of round.

Rnd 2: knit.

Rnd 3: *k8 k2tog* to end of round.

Rnd 4: knit.

Rnd 5: *k7 k2tog* to end of round.

Rnd 6: knit.

Rnd 7: *k6 k2tog* to end of round.

Rnd 8: knit.

Rnd 9: *k5 k2tog* to end of round.

Rnd 10: *k4 k2tog* to end of round.

Rnd 11: *k3 k2tog* to end of round.

Rnd 12: *k2 k2tog* to end of round.

Rnd 13: *k1 k2tog* to end of round.

Rnd 14: *k2tog* to end of round.

You should have 8 stitches left. Cut the yarn, leaving a 6" tail.

Thread the long tail onto a needle, and slip the 8 remaining stitches onto the thread.

Pull tight and sew over the hole at the top a few times. Weave in ends.

Pirouette Hat By: Dot from littletheorem

Put a spin on the traditional knit hat pattern with the <u>Pirouette Hat</u>. This beautiful salmon-colored hat is knit in a unique lace pattern that has five stitch repeats and one extra stitch in the round. This extra stitch gives the Pirouette Hat a twirl effect, much like the arms of a tiny ballerina. This pretty pink hat is the perfect finishing touch to a cold weather ensemble, adding just enough color and a hint of texture.



Materials:

- Less than 1 ball Malabrigo Worsted Yarn (= less than 192m)
- 4.5mm/US 8 dpns

Gauge: 18st = 10 cm

Size: 19" circumference, 9" high.

Abbreviations:

k1fb = knit into the front, then the back, of the next stitch

Instructions:

Note: "To end of row" means to work 3 dpns rather than 81 stitches.

CO 80 stitches, 30 on first needle, 25 on second, 25 on third. Work in k2 p2 rib for 8 rounds.

k1fb, k2, k2tog, yo *k3, k2tog, yo* until hat measures 7". You should end up working a k2tog at the end of each dpn (and working the next yo at the start of the following dpn).

For the last five stitches on last dpn before decrease, only work k3 k2tog.

Decrease

Row 1: *k3 k2tog yo k3 k2tog* to end of row (i.e. repeat the part in **'s 8 times)

(i.e. repeat the part in **'s 8 times)

Row 2: *yo k2 k2tog yo k3 k2tog* to end of row

Row 3: *k2 k2tog yo k3 k2tog* to end of row

Row 4: *yo k1 k2 tog yo k3 k2 tog* to end of

Row 5: *k1 k2tog yo k3 k2tog* to end of row

Row 6: *yo k2tog yo k3 k2tog* to end of row

Row 7: *k2tog yo k3 k2tog* to end of row

Row 8: *k4 k2tog yo* to end of row

Row 9: k3 k2 tog *k4 k2tog* to end of row

Row 10: *k3 k2tog yo* to end of row

Row 11: k2 k2tog *k3 k2tog* to end of row

Row 12: *k2 k2tog yo* to end of row

Row 13: k1 k2tog *k2 k2tog* to end of row

Row 14: *k1 k2tog yo* to end of row

Row 15: k2tog *k1 k2tog* fto end of row

Row 16: *k2tog* to end of row

With 8 stitches remaining, cut yarn, leaving a 6" tail. Thread tail through remaining stitches, pull tight and secure inside the hat. Weave in ends.



Handspun Star Hat

By: Dot from littletheorem

Cozy and cabled, the Handspun Star Hat is a classic cold weather option you'll love putting on again and again. This adorable cable knit hat is a sleek and chic version of the traditional, bulky winter hat. All grown up, the Handspun Star Hat is a cozy yet elegant cable knit hat in a soft color palette with a few tiny star buttons for a sweet detail. This cute and cozy knit hat makes a great gift, but it's so sweet you may want to keep it for yourself.



Materials:

- 120m handspun yarn from handpainted fiber (e.g. Malabrigo Yarn – Merino Worsted, Cascade Yarns – Sierra, Debbie Bliss Yarns – Cashmerino Aran)
- 5 mm/US 8 dpns
- Buttons
- Embroidery thread

Gauge: 18 stitches = 4" in stocking stitch.

Size: Stretches to fit most heads.

Abbreviations:

CO = cast on

dpn = double pointed needle

pm = place marker

slm = slip marker

ssk = slip two stitches knitwise, then knit them

together with left hand needle

K2tog = knit two stitches together

C6F = slip 3 stitches onto cable needle and hold to the front of your work, knit the next 3 stitches from left-hand needle, then the three

stitches from the cable needle

Instructions:

Cable Pattern

Rnd 1: *k6 p2* to end of round

Rnd 2: As round 1

Round 3: *C6F p2* to end of round

Round 4: As round 1

CO 120 stitches over 3 dpns and join in the round. Work in cable pattern until hat measures 6.5." To avoid the scalloped look at the edge of the hat, work in k6 p2 rib for 4 rounds before starting the cable pattern. After 6.5," ending on round 3, work decreases as follows:

Decrease

Set-up Row: k3 pm *k3 (p2 k6) twice p2 k3 pm* to last 21 stitches, k3 (p2 k6) twice p2

Note: It's easier to give instructions if the start of the round is the first marker, so k3 and start rounds at the marker from now on.

Rnd 1: *slm k2tog k1 (p2 k6) twice, p2 k1 ssk*

to end of round (110 stitches)

Rnd 2: *slm k2 (p2 k6) twice, p2 k2* to end of

round



Rnd 3: *slm k2tog (p2 C6F) twice p2 ssk* to end of round (100 stitches).

Rnd 4: *slm k1 (p2 k6) twice p2 k1* to end of round

Rnd 5: *slm k2tog p1 k6 p2 k6 p1 ssk* to end of round (90 stitches)

Rnd 6: *slm k1 p1 k6 p2 k6 p1 k1* to end of round

Rnd 7: *slm k2tog C6F p2 C6F ssk* to end of round (80 stitches)

Rnd 8: *slm k7 p2 k7* to end of round

Rnd 9: *slm k2tog k5 p2 k5 ssk* to end of round (70 stitches)

Rnd 10: *slm k2tog k4 p2 k4 ssk* to end of round (60 stitches)

Rnd 11: *slm k2tog k3 p2 k3 ssk* to end of round (50 stitches)

Rnd 12 *slm k2tog k2 p2 k2 ssk* to end of round (40 stitches)

Rnd 13: *slm k2tog k1 p2 k1 ssk* to end of round (30 stitches)

Rnd 14: *slm k2tog p2 ssk* to end of round (20 stitches)

Rnd 15: *slm k2tog ssk* to end of round (10 stitches)

Cut the yarn leaving a 10" tail. Thread this through the remaining stitches and pull tight. Sew over the hole a couple of times and weave in any loose ends.
